

FY16 House and Senate Proposed Funding Levels for Select HUD Programs

Program	H.R. 2577	Senate Committee
National Housing Trust Fund (NHTF)	Essentially eliminates the NHTF by transferring funds from the NHTF to HOME; prohibits Congress from directing any funds into the NHTF.	No action.
HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME)	\$900 million Cuts \$133 million and directs an estimated \$133 million from the NHTF to HOME to make up for the cut. The proposed FY16 appropriation is less than half of FY10 enacted level.	\$66 million Cuts funding from \$900 million in FY15 to \$66 million in FY16 (a 93 percent cut).
Tenant Based Rental Assistance	\$19.918 billion Despite this three percent increase from FY15, HUD estimates that it needs another \$183 million to renew all current 28,000 Housing Choice Vouchers. Does not restore the 67,000 vouchers lost due to FY13 sequestration.	\$19.934 billion Enables HUD to renew all existing Housing Choice Vouchers.
Project Based Rental Assistance	\$10.654 billion Underfunds PBRA by \$106 million so HUD cannot honor existing Section 8 vouchers and shifts funding to a calendar year cycle.	\$10.760 billion Enables HUD to renew current contracts for 12 months.
Homeless Assistance	\$2.185 billion Supports 15,000 fewer homeless or at-risk families with rapid rehousing and 255,000 fewer units of permanent supportive housing for the chronically homeless by cutting the Homeless Assistance Grant program by \$296 million.	\$2.235 billion Increases funding by \$100 million from FY15. \$40 million is directed to address youth homelessness.

Choice Neighborhoods	\$20 million Funds Choice Neighborhoods 75 percent below FY15.	\$65 million Cuts \$15 million from FY 2015; historically the lowest level of funding since the program's inception in fiscal year 2010. May result in the elimination of Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grants.
Office of Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Homes	\$75 million Results in at least 3,400 fewer low-income children from receiving lead hazard control in their homes by cutting the program by 30 percent from FY15.	\$110 million Maintains funding from FY15.
Public Housing Capital Fund	\$1.681 billion Cuts almost \$200 million. Public housing faces more than \$26 billion repair backlog.	\$1.743 billion Cuts \$133 million. Would leave a majority of public housing capital needs unmet for the more than 1.1 million currently assisted households.
Public Housing Operating Fund	\$4.44 billion Maintains FY15 funding.	\$4.5 billion \$60 million increase over FY15.
Supportive Housing for the Elderly (Section 202)	\$417 million Increases funding from FY15 by \$41 million.	\$420 million Maintains FY15 funding.
Supportive Housing for Persons with Disabilities (Section 811)	\$152 million Increases funding from FY15 by \$17 million.	\$137 million Provides a \$2 million increase over FY15.
Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA)	\$335 million Increases funding from FY15 by \$5million.	\$330 million Maintains FY15 funding level.
Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)	\$3.06 billion Decreases funding by \$6 million from FY15.	\$2.9 billion Decreases funding by \$1.66 billion from FY15.

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
