

Access to safe, affordable homes builds a strong foundation for families and communities. But too many Minnesotans lack good housing options.

Cook County is the only county in Minnesota to see a decrease in rent and a decrease in renter income.

The income for families is not rising at the same pace as home values, making it more difficult for families to purchase and own a home.


HOUSING STOCK: While a significant portion of the rental and owner-occupied housing is aging (built before 1970), new construction is not keeping up with demand. Of particular concern is the gap between the number of available units for extremely low income households – and the number of people who need them.

Disparities: Disparities are stark for BIPOC residents of all 87 counties. Homeownership disparities are above 65% in every county in Minnesota with most over 90%. Cost-burden is higher for BIPOC renters (52%) than white renters (44%) in Greater MN.



684 households in Cook County pay more than 30 percent of their income toward housing costs, putting them at risk of being unable to afford basic needs like food and medicine. 317 are severely cost-burdened and pay more than 50 percent of their income on housing.

SEVERE COST BURDEN Number and percent of households paying more than 50% of their income toward housing.



WAGES: Housing remains a challenge even for Minnesotans who are fully employed. The median earnings for most of the top in-demand and high-growth jobs in the Northeast region do not cover housing costs at an affordable level. Those working at the median wage – and especially those earning the minimum wage – cannot afford a two-bedroom apartment or the mortgage for a median price home.

HOMELESSNESS: In the Northland region, too many families, seniors and children are still suffering the devastating consequences of having no place to call home.
